#JesusToo: Christianity is keeping us radical

This headline in The Sunday Times got my attention: *#JesusToo: Christianity is keeping us radical, says historian. Tom Holland's new book paints Christianity not as a staid religion but as a subversive energy that is still 'ripping up society.'*

And what claims he makes in *Dominion: the Making of the Western Mind*. According to this radical new history, Christianity is a major catalyst for transformation as it "repeatedly sends out pulses of energy that rip up society." It is the "greatest revolutionary movement" the western world has ever seen, paving the way for secularism, civil rights movement, the Beatles and #MeToo.

He says Christianity has two deeply subversive ideas at its heart: that all people are equal and that the weak are heroic. "The first is there in Genesis: that God created every man and woman in his image, giving an inherent dignity to every human. The other thing Christianity does in the context of classical civilisation — Greece and Rome — is unbelievably radical: it places a premium on the weakest of the weak."

This is embodied in the crucifixion, when Jesus "suffered the excruciating death of the lowest of the low. This is the idea that lies molten at the heart of Christianity: the fact that the beggar or criminal might be closer to God than the king, emperor or Pope."

These Christian tenets gave rise to a "truly radical idea," that every human being has rights. This put in place the conditions for revolutions many centuries later, including the secularism of the Enlightenment, which he says, is imbued with Christian values, "the welfare state, concern for minorities and the poor."

In the 1960s, Martin Luther King used Christian ideas to win white support for civil rights, echoing the biblical line that there is no "Greek or Jew" to argue for equality of all races. "White Christians had to accept the truth of that and, although there was a lot of hostility towards King, the civil rights movement was effective because he was able to prick the consciences of white Americans."

Meanwhile, Christian ideas become divorced from religion, a trend embodied by the Beatles: "The Beatles articulate deeply Christian ideas that are absorbed without any reference to Christianity: all you need is love."

Holland sees the #MeToo movement as a return to a puritan idea that men have no rights over women's bodies. "Puritans were interested in sex in marriage but against men sleeping around. In the 1960s, western society became more sexualised and men felt they had a right to harass women, so #MeToo is essentially an attempt to reimpose Christian sexual morality, but without admitting it's sexual morality."

PCC Update

Leadership Community Day Reflections included: It was good to be together as a community, to have space to reflect on the church in a wider context, to look at where we are. Now we need space for prayer rather than quickly moving into action.

Inside Out Green Pastures has partnered with New Life Church to purchase a 30 bed hostel on Harrington Street. We are now exploring other options for partnerships, including with YMCA, and also Faith Hope Enterprise, a Christian organisation offering a 3 bed property exclusively for Inside Out, with potential for other properties in the future, including for women. There will be no financial risk to us.

We are building relationships with CT Skills (Education Provider offering courses as introduction for work) and building a portfolio of activities for people to be involved in.

We have 11 mentees and there is a growing sense of community. A Facebook page has been set up, and mentees are using that to offer support to one another.

Appointment of Kismet Barber as Vicar's PA and Projects Administrator Kismet will work 2 days for chaplaincy (Workplace Chaplaincy in Derbyshire and Derby City Centre Chaplaincy in the upstairs office), 1 day for Inside Out, 2 days for St. Peter's.

Bishop Lonsdale C of E Primary School Anita is a Foundation Governor at this school in the parish of St. Luke's, Stockbrook but whose catchment covers part of our parish. There may be occasions for pupils to visit St. Peter's if St. Luke's is not available. A school is being built in our parish on the new Castleward development.

John Ferguson Following a Bishop's Advisory Panel that included interviews, a pastoral exercise and presentation, John has been recommended for ordination training. He plans to be self-supporting and work full-time and offer part-time ministry.

Treasurer's Report Neil reported that we have over £70k in the current account. A legacy has been received for just under £20k, and gift aid is just under £13k.

Safeguarding Anita is working with Kismet to build on the work already completed in the Safeguarding Audit and will report back to PCC.

Building Report We need to renew the slates and lead work on the vestry roof. It was agreed to raise money for the work at the Gift Day in the October.
