Holidays and Holy Days

Many people hope to be going on holiday in the coming weeks (covid permitting!), and some of us have already enjoyed some time away in recent days.

Whether or not you're going away, you can still have a holiday in the true meaning of the word. The word holiday derived from the notion of "Holy Day", and gradually evolved to its current form. The word comes from the Old English word hāligdæg and originally referred only to special religious days. In modern use, it means any special day of rest or relaxation, as opposed to normal days away from work.

Rest – physical and spiritual - is important. In the Bible God offers His people tranquility, peace, rest. But they refuse. Isaiah 30:15 says "This is what the Sovereign LORD, the Holy One of Israel, says: "Only in returning to me and resting in me will you be saved. In quietness and confidence is your strength. But you would have none of it." What a sad and disappointing choice to make.

And in Jeremiah 6:16 it says, "This is what the LORD says: "Stop at the crossroads and look around. Ask for the old, godly way, and walk in it. Travel its path, and you will find rest for your souls. But you reply, 'No, that's not the road we want!" What a sad and disappointing choice to make.

Look at the elements God offers for our good! Repentance, rest, quietness, trust, ancient paths, good ways. Yet we can sometimes be like the people in these passages who refuse to accept his gifts. There are no demands here, just hints at God's design for us to live out of wholeness. And there is no defensiveness here, no fear, no anger, but only God's invitation to grow and live, and people's refusal.

So this summer, whether we go away or stay at home, may we take intentional time to return and rest in God, to stop at the crossroads and find rest for our souls. This is what God invites us to do – to pause and take stock, to reflect, and to enter into a deeper and spiritual rest.

Many years ago St Augustine of Hippo wrote: "Thou hast made us for thyself, O Lord, and our heart is restless until it finds its rest in thee." In the midst of the uncertainty we still live with, may we discover the truth of those words for ourselves as we seek rest and refreshment in God.

From Bishop Libby

Yesterday, we were told, was 'Freedom Day'. We no longer have the constraints of law to manage our behaviour and actions. We are asked to use our own discretion, making personal choices for the common good.

The Christian community, together as well as individually, has always known that true freedom means putting others first. St Paul wrote to the Christian community in Galatia: 'For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbour as yourself". Live by the Spirit ... for the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things."

My prayer is that we are beacons in our communities in these coming months of such love and service, displaying those fruits of the Spirit – with one another and in all the contexts we find ourselves.

For some, the relaxing of limitations and regulations is a delight and long-awaited, but for others it is a cause for anxiety and further concern. I hope you are able to enjoy life more fully, and I hope you do so in ways that give peace and joy to others, rather than bring greater risk and compound fear.

I'm looking forward to being with you more, in person, to hear your stories, share your concerns, listen to your hopes and pray together. May we discover together that the service of God, the author of peace and lover of concord, is perfect freedom (BCP Collect for Peace).

Praying for the Persecuted Church: Nigeria

Almost half of Nigerians are Christians – 95.4 million people from a population of 206.2 million – but most of these are in the south of the country. Northern Nigeria is largely Muslim, and it's in the north and the central region of Nigeria that most persecution of Christians happens.

More Christians are murdered for their faith in Nigeria than in any other country. Violent attacks by Boko Haram, Fulani militants, ISWAP (an affiliate of so-called Islamic State) and other Islamic extremist groups are common in the north and middle belt of the country, and are becoming more common further south.

In these attacks, Christians are often murdered or have their property and means of livelihood destroyed. Men and boys are particularly vulnerable to being killed, with the intention of lowering the birth rate of Christian communities and removing their sources of income. Perpetrators are seldom brought to justice. Christian women are often abducted and raped by these militant groups, and sometimes forced to marry Muslims.

Christians from a Muslim background face rejection by and pressure from their families. Muhammadu Buhari's presidency (2015 onwards) has seen a sharp increase in attempts to force Islamisation on the country, including appointing Muslims to key government positions.

Nigeria has risen several places on the World Watch List, and persecution has worsened in all areas of public and private life. Violence continues to be extreme, and Islamic extremist attacks have not abated during the Covid-19 pandemic. Many Christians who are staying at home to combat the spread of the virus have been vulnerable to attack. Please pray for our sisters and brothers in Nigeria. (from the Open Doors website)
