Stay Awake!(2)

Last week I shared thoughts from an article by a church leader in London, Jason Swan Clark, entitled "Stay Awake: Why this might be the most dangerous time," highlighting the reality of loss during the pandemic, and the need to make space for grief. As Christians, denying loss is not only unhelpful but unbiblical. The article cites NT Wright, the New Testament scholar, who suggests that we stop trying to explain 'why is this happening' and instead practice the biblical notion of lament:

"The point of lament, woven thus into the fabric of the biblical tradition, is not just that it's an outlet for our frustration, sorrow, loneliness and sheer inability to understand what is happening or why. The mystery of the biblical story is that God also laments. Some Christians like to think of God as above all that, knowing everything, in charge of everything, calm and unaffected by the troubles in his world. That's not the picture we get in the Bible."

Nowhere is that more true than in the story of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane. And it's significant that Jesus takes three disciples with him - Peter, James, and John. What does he ask them to do? To pray and watch with him. But if course, they don't. They fall asleep, not simply because of being physically tired but because of their deep distress and sorrow (Luke 22:45).

Swan Clark writes: Falling asleep in the face of trauma is a psychological protection mechanism. After everything the disciples had experienced with Jesus, it all seemed to have unravelled and come crashing down. Not only did they have their own losses to bear, the investments they had made for the mission of Jesus, but they could also see the anguish Jesus was in.

I tried to imagine going from the highs of the miracles and intimacy and experiences of ministry with Jesus to that moment in the Garden. A moment when all seemed lost, and even Jesus was in despair, telling the disciples, "My soul is deeply grieved, to the point of death" (Matthew 26:38). I suspect I would have closed my eyes too and wished I could escape, hoping this was not really happening.*

This story warns of the danger of falling asleep in the face of loss. It's tempting to fall asleep through denial and throwing ourselves into anything that avoids dwelling with our losses. But staying awake is something Jesus wanted the disciples to learn in Gethsemane – hence he asked them three times. May we have the grace to stay awake in the coming weeks and months as we look back and forwards;

Praying for the Persecuted Church: Syria

Syria has about 677,000 Christians, about 3.6 per cent of a population of almost 19 million. The number of Christians in the country has decreased in the past decade, as many have fled conflict and persecution.

Persecution remains extreme in public and private life for Christians in Syria. Christians from a Muslim background are vulnerable to pressure from their family and communities, who perceive conversion from Islam as bringing dishonour. Sometimes these families even request that local officials covertly monitor Christian converts.

In areas controlled by Islamic extremist groups, public expressions of Christianity are banned and most churches have been seized or destroyed. In government-controlled areas, this threat is less – but there are still numerous abductions of church leaders, and Islamic dissidents are still active. Violent attacks continue, while Covid-19 has exacerbated many existing vulnerabilities in the past year.

Syria's continuing civil war has made the country a breeding ground for Christian persecution. The unrest, which was beginning to lessen, has been exacerbated by the economic crisis caused by Covid-19.

"Covid-19 has a big impact on Qamishli [in northern Syria]; normal life is almost nonexistent," Pastor George explains. "The number of poor people has increased. Especially those people who are daily labourers who, if they don't have work today, receive no wages."

Many Christians are still internally displaced or refugees in other countries because of over a decade of war and rising Islamic extremism. In northern Syria, invasion by Turkish forces in late 2019 caused greater instability, and seems to have been used by some Islamic extremists as a cover for opportunities to target Christians.

Pastor George is an Open Doors partner who, like many such partners, has stood with his church through years of conflict, persecution and difficulty. Now he is making sure that his church can be a light in the darkness: ""I see men, women and children crying of hunger. It's tragic. Our church saw that now was a time to stand by the people, support them and show Jesus' love in difficult times."
