Putting out into deep water: 2

Last Sunday we began our new series of talks, 'Putting out into deep water', based on Jesus' challenge to the disciples in Luke 5. The Acts of the Apostles is a wonderful testament to how the early Christians responded to that challenge and 'put out into the deep', taking the message of the gospel throughout Asia and founding many thriving centres of Christian community. If you have time, please do read through Acts chapters 16 - 20, the chapters on which our series is based (we don't have time to read the whole chapters in our Sunday worship, and it will help to set the talks in context). Reading the chapters together helps us to see the bigger picture, and trace the leading of God's Spirit in the events and encounters described.

Margaret launched our series with Acts 16 and the story of the apostles in Philippi, a place of metaphorical 'deep water', a new continent and culture. Initially the apostles must wondered where to start – there was no synagogue to preach in, no familiar places of meeting. But the Holy Spirit is at work, and they are led to a group of women praying by the river. Lydia becomes the first convert, inviting others into her home to establish a church. Paul and Silas, finding themselves in prison, bear witness to the gospel and lead the gaoler and his household to faith. Unexpected people in unexpected places! God is at work in that place, bringing the apostles into contact with the right people at the right time.

As we look forward as a community and prepare to put out into deep water, it's worth taking time to look back with gratitude and see God's hand at work in our own situation, bringing the right people at the right time. Margaret said in her talk:

Here at St Peter's God brought Paul Morris. His lasting legacy for us was to build the extension with the lift and break-out area, and to make space for activity within the church building itself. Proverbs 16.9 says, 'In their hearts humans plan their course, but the LORD establishes their steps.' Are you and I in that place where God can use us, his people here, living for him? As Paul sails to Macedonia, God has prepared the way for individuals to respond to the Gospel.

In the coming weeks as we reflect on where God is calling us in the future, may we draw on God's goodness and faithfulness to us, not only in the building of St. Peter's Centre but in so many ways, over so many years, and through so many people – some unexpected, but the right people in the right place at the right time.

Praying for the Persecuted Church: Saudi Arabia

There are an estimated 1.2 million Christians in Saudi Arabia. It's a small percentage (3.5%) of the country's total population of 34.7 million, the majority of whom are Muslim.

Whether Saudi or expatriate, Christians living in Saudi Arabia – where the official religion and law is Islamic – can expect to encounter severe opposition to their faith.

The few Saudi Christians from a Muslim background face enormous pressure, especially from families. Leaving Islam is one of the biggest sins a Muslim can commit.

Men could face physical and emotional abuse, and public shaming. To get them to recant, material incentives are offered – but refusing could entail death. Meanwhile, women could face a range of consequences, including forced marriage, divorce, sexual abuse and house-arrest. The submissive position of women in Saudi society can make it treacherously difficult to escape. Whether male or female, it is little wonder many believers choose to keep their new faith secret.

Besides being exploited and poorly paid, Asian and African workers are regularly exposed to verbal and physical abuse because of their ethnicity and low status. Being a Christian can exacerbate this. Expatriate Christians are wary of sharing their faith and gathering for fellowship as it could lead to detention and deportation.

Nevertheless, the small number of Saudi Christians has been slowly increasing and they are becoming bolder, sharing their faith with others on the internet and Christian satellite TV channels. Such public action has led to serious repercussions from Saudi families and authorities.

Please keep praying for your brothers and sisters in Saudi Arabia. Your prayers make an enormous difference to those following Jesus no matter the cost.
